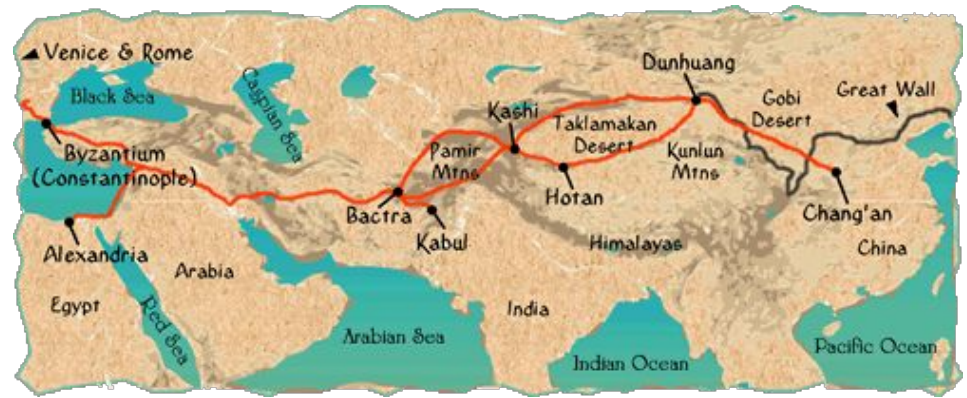


silk road (noun)

- a land route connecting China to Italy
- Traders made their way to Europe on the ancient route called the silk road.



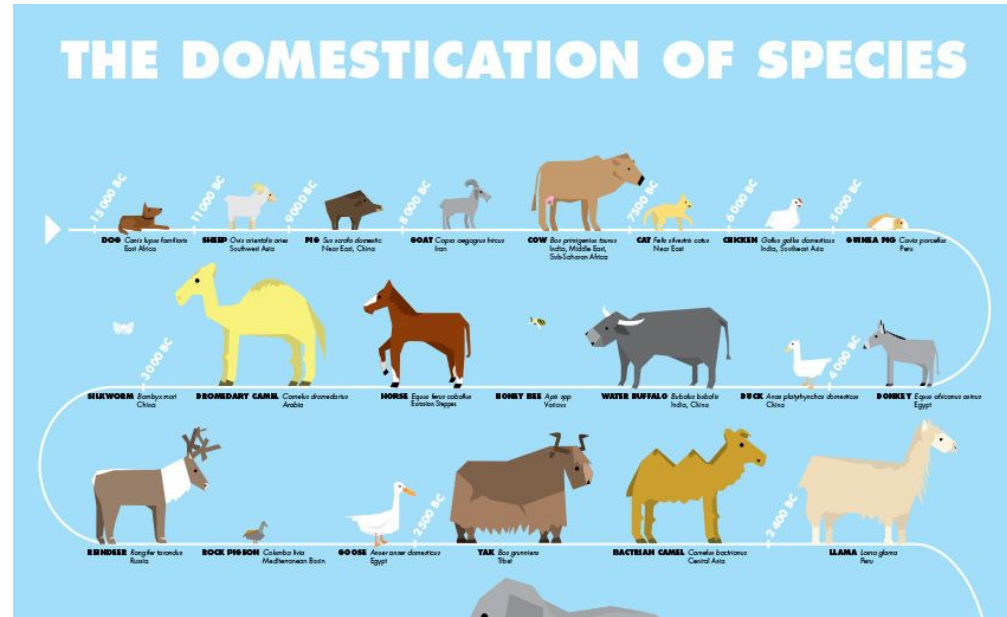
ex-port (verb)

- to convert animals for the use of humans.
- The silk road was successful because of the domestication of the camel.

- a group of people traveling across a long distance together.
- **Caravans** had to travel through many kingdoms.



dyn-a-sty (noun)

- a succession of people to rule a country.
- The Han **dynasty** ruled over China for 400 years.



hey-dey (noun)

- the period of a place or country's greatest successes.
- In its heyday, thousands of people traveled the silk road.



Cul-tur-al dif-fus-ion (noun)

- Spread of cultural beliefs from one group to another.
- The silk road encouraged cultural diffusion.
